Elder Manns' Tour Through the North and South.

On March 17th, I left Savannah for a tour of Florida. I visited Jacksonville, St. Petersburg, Tampa, Lakeland, Punta Gorda, Orlanda, Hawthorne, East Palatka and Gainesville. Many subscriptions were taken for the Free Advent Banner in the Land of Flowers. It is gratifying indeed, to note the success with which the Banner is meeting.

Sabbath, March 19th and 26th, I spent with Gainesville company. Here, a good work is being done by our Bible worker, Sister A. B. Brown. In this little city she has been working since our last camp-meeting last Fall in Brunswick, Ga. Several new members have been added to the company, and are standing firm for the truth. When Sister Brown commenced her work in Gainesville, the Tithe and Offerings were about \$3.00 per month. Now the Tithe and Offerings amount to about \$20.00 per month. Indeed, we rejoice because of the progress being made by this little band of believers.

After returning from Florida I went on a trip North, spending a few days in Washington, D. C. Here I met a number of the colored S. D. A. Ministers attending the Spring Counsel of the Gen. Conference. These representatives of the Negro race, presented quite a sad picture after their bitter disappointment to secure for them-

selves a Negro Seventh-day Adventists Conference, but were not allowed to cross over into the promise land. They must wonder back on the ground over which they trod more than twelve years ago. Many of them will die in this wilderness, of prejudice and discrimination, waiting for their brethren to give them what they want, which these leaders will never do, and which these Negroes will not get until they rise and take it.

After leaving Washington, I visited New York, and New Haven, Conn. I met brother H. E. Alston, who was formerly connected with the Connecticut Conference of S. D. A. He was also at one time connected with the Greater New York Conference. In February, 1921, he withdrew from the white brethren of S. D. A. and connected with Free Seventh-day Adventist, and has been placed in charge of our work in New York, N. Y., and New Haven, Conn. Brother Alston is conducting services in the LaFayette Hall, Cor. 131st Street and Seventh Avenue. All Free Seventh-day Adventists should attend services at this place. Be faithful, and help to build up a good strong church in this city. Services conducted every Sabbath at 10 o'clock a. m. and Sunday night at 8 o'clock. More about our work in the North in the next issue.

(Continued from last issue) used Peter to carry the message to the household of Cornelius. We also know that a great work has been done by our white brethren in meeting the masses of our colored people, and we believe that God is still using many of them. But it is not needed that one must look through a dark glass to see that a mighty conversion must take place to convince our white brethren that God is no respecter of persons." Acts 10 34.

Cornelius was a Gentile. He loved God. God heard his prayers, and according to the great plan of salvation, he had a right to eternal life. Titus 2: 11, 12. Cornelius must be taught. Peter had been called to the ministry but had confined his labor among his own people, the Jews. Therefore a special work was necessary to prepare him to preach to others.

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EDITORIAL

All wise people gladly receive the Banner. Fools treat it with contempt. One brother from Florida writes: "Your good little paper the Free Advent Banner, has caused a great stir in our church. Last Sabbath, April 30th., the assistant elder of our church received a copy of the paper, and he stood up and called the attention of the people, and tore the "Banner" all to pieces, and threw the fragments over the church floor, and said, he did not want such a paper in his church, neither did he want anybody that was on the side of Elder Manns in the church. He made many of his people mad."

History repeats itself. Our good assistant elder of this Seventh-day Adventist church has evidently forgotten that many, many years ago, a message was sent to king Jehoiakim, the prophet of God, which message the king treated with such contempt. The king took his penknife and cut the roll containing the message of God, and threw it into the fire. This assistant elder tore it up, and threw its fragments over the church floor. The king lost his throne. Time will tell what will happen to this assistant elder.

Read Jeremiah chapter 36. The brother continues, "I wish I were able to put a tent here for you. I wish you could come down here now."

Our cause is a just one. Our brethren, both white and black, know it. We will be as harsh as truth, as uncompromising as justice. We are in earnest. We will not equivocate. We will not excuse such wrong doing of our white brethren against the colored people. The **Prejudices, Discrimination and Walls of Distinction** built up by our white brethren must be condemned, as well as taxation without representation. We will not retreat a single inch, and we will be heard by Seventh-day Adventists, everywhere.

The Banner is making many friends everywhere. One minister of the S. D. A., who loves liberty and believes that all of us should have freedom in Christ, has sent forty or more names, whom he thinks ought to read the Banner. He writes: "I think the Banner ought to be placed in every Seventh-day Adventist's home." "Elder Manns," he writes, "every conference officer ought to have the Banner, and especially the April issue."

It is preached from some of the leading S. D. A. pulpits, that members of Free Seventh-day Adventist have apostatized and are no more in the truth. Such false and slanderous remarks are made just because they have decided to do some thinking for themselves, and not be compelled to have their white brother do all of it for them.

However, we hold no controversy with anyone about such false and malicious teaching. We have concluded, first, that every **True Hearted Christian, is Clean Inside And Outside.** He looks neither up to the white face, nor down on the Black face. 2nd. He is always considerate to all man-kind. 3rd. He is too brave to lie, and too

generous to misrepresent his brethren.

8. Thou shalt not be afraid to blow thine own horn, for he who faileth to blow his own horn at the proper occasion, findeth nobody standing ready to blow it for him.

9. Thou shalt not hesitate to say "no" when thou meanest "no," nor shalt thou fail to remember that there are times when it is unsafe to bind thyself to a hasty judgment.

10. Thou shalt give every man a square deal. This is the last great commandment and there is no other like unto it. Upon this commandment hangs the law and profits of the business world.

THE FALLING STARS

Signs of our Lord's Return

According to the Saviour's words, signs in the sun, moon, and stars would herald to the world the near approach of His second coming.

Matthew tells us that the stars would fall from heaven. Matt. 24:29. The manner of their fall is given by John. "The stars of heaven fell unto the earth even as a fig tree casteth her untimely figs when she is shaken of a mighty wind." Rev. 6:13. Fruit flies in all directions from a tree shaken by a mighty wind, so we would conclude when the stars fell as described above, they would fall in all directions from one place in the heavens.

There have been many showers of stars, but astronomers tell us that the great shower of stars of Nov. 13, 1833 was different from all others in this particular: "It seemed as if the whole starry heavens had congregated at one point near the zenith, and were simultaneously shooting forth with the velocity of lightning, to every part of the horizon." Christian Advocate and Journal, of Dec. 13, 1833.

Professor Olmstead, Yale College, says:

"The meteors did not fly at random over all parts of the sky, but appeared to emanate from a point in the constellations Leo, near a star called Gamma Leonis in the bend of the sickle.

"The extent of the shower of 1833 was such as to cover no inconsiderable part of the earth's surface, from the middle of the Atlantic on the east, the Pacific on the west, and from the northern coast of South America to undefined regions on the north."

The sun was darkened May 19, 1780 and the stars fell Nov. 13, 1833. In speaking of these very signs, Christ said:

"Now learn a parable of the fig tree; when his branches is yet tender, and putteth forth leaves, ye know that Summer is nigh; so like-wise, when ye shall see all these things, know that He (margin) is near, even at the doors." Then, as if to make it doubly sure, He adds: "This generation shall not pass away." Matt. 24:32-25.

The people who witnessed the falling of the stars in 1833 are growing very old. "He which testifieth these things saith, surely I come quickly. Amen. Even so, come Lord Jesus."

"The heavens declare the glory of God."

How To Become Patient.

We are admonished by the Lord to follow after patience. 1 Tim. 6:11. There are three things by which patience can become a part of our characters.

1st. "Tribulation worketh patience." Rom. 5:3. The one that has endured the most trials in the true spirit of Christ is one in whom the grace of patience is most fully developed. The one realizes this will "glory in tribulation," rather than murmur and complain.

2nd. "The trying of your faith worketh patience." James 1:3. The very place where the majority of people lose their patience, is where the child of God gains patience. When our faith is seemingly tried to the utmost and we calmly wait for

God to work, then we develop true patience.

3rd. Add "to temperance patience." 2 Peter 1:6. Intemperance and patience do not dwell together. If we would be patient we must be temperate in our habits and thus cooperate with the Lord in trying to have steady nerves and a clear mind.

Tribulation, the trial of our faith, and temperate living, with the grace of God, will enable the impatient to become patient.

PRAYER.

It is the duty of all to pray whether they are converted or not. Prayer is an acknowledgement of God as the One from whom we receive the blessings we enjoy. To acknowledge God is simply just and consistent. When we pray we talk with God. When we read His word God talks with us. Conversation should be held with God daily.

Daniel was placed over one hundred and twenty princes; he stood next to the king in the mightiest kingdom that ever existed on the face of the earth, yet, "He kneeled upon his knees three times a day and prayed."

David, the king of Israel, said, "As for me, I will call upon God; and the Lord shall save me. Evening, morning, and at noon, will I pray and cry aloud; and He shall hear my voice."

These were audible prayers; God listened to the words. They were offered by men of God. If these men, with duties of a kingdom on their hands could find time to pray three times a day, cannot we?

"Prayer is appointed to convey the blessings God to give; Long as they live should Christians pray."

GOD'S REST DAY.

Below, we quote all the texts in the Bible referring to the first day of the week, and a few texts which speak of the seventh day; we will leave the reader to decide which day is

the Bible Sabbath.

The Seventh Day of the Week.

Gen. 2:2,3. "On the seventh day God ended His work which he had made; and rested on the seventh day from all His work which he had made. And God blessed the seventh day, and sanctified it because that in it He had rested from all His work which God created and made."

Ex. 20:9, 10. "Six days shalt thou labor, and do all thy work; but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord, thy God; in it thou shalt do any work."

Ex. 20:11. "For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea and all that in them is, and rested the seventh day; wherefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day, and hallowed it."

Ex. 31:16, 17. "Wherefore the children of Israel shall keep the Sabbath, to observe the Sabbath throughout their generations, for a perpetual covenant. It is a sign between me and the children of Israel forever; for in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, and on the seventh day He rested, and was refreshed."

Ex. 34:21. Six days shalt thou work, but on the seventh day thou shalt rest; in earing time and in harvest time thou shalt rest.

Luke 23:54-56. "And that day was the preparation and the Sabbath drew on. And the women . . . followed after, and beheld the sepulchre, and how His body was laid. And they returned and prepared spices and ointments; and rested the Sabbath according to the commandments."

Luke 4:16. "He (Jesus) came to Nazareth, where He had been brought up; and as His custom was, He went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day, and stood up for to read."

Isa. 58:13, 14. "If thou turn thy foot from the Sabbath from doing thy pleasure on my holy day; and call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable; and shalt honor Him, not doing thine own ways nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words,

then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord.”

Acts 17:2; 16:13. “Paul as his manner was, went in unto them, and three Sabbath days reasoned with them out of the scriptures.”

“On the Sabbath we went out of the city by a river side where prayer was wont to be made; and we sat down, and spake unto the women which restored thither.”

Matt. 24:20; 5:17. “Pray that your flight be not in the winter, neither on the Sabbath day.”

“Think not that I am come to destroy the law or the prophets; I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil.

First Day of the Week.

Gen. 1:3-5. “God said, Let there be light; and there was light. And God saw the light, that it was good, and God divided the light from the darkness. And called the light Day and the darkness He called Night. And the evening and the morning were the first day.”

Eze. 46:1. “Thus saith the Lord God: the gate of the inner court that looketh toward the east shall be shut the six working days; but on the Sabbath it shall be opened.”

Matt. 28:1. “In the end of the Sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mary Magdalene and the other Mary to see the sepulchre.”

Mark 16:1; 2. “When the Sabbath was past, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome, had brought sweet spices, that they might come and anoint Him. And very early in the morning the first day of the week, they came unto the sepulchre at the rising of the sun.”

Mark 16:9. “Now when Jesus was risen the first day of the week, He appeared first to Mary Magdalene, out of whom He had cast seven devils.”

Luke 24:1, 2. “Now upon the first day of the week, very early in the morning, they came unto the sepulchre, bringing the spices which they had prepared, and certain others with

them. And they found the stone rolled away from the sepulchre.”

John 20:19, 20. “Then the same day at evening, being the first day of the week, when the doors were shut where the disciples were assembled for fear of the Jews, came Jesus and stood in the midst, and saith unto them, Peace be unto you. And when He had so said, He showed unto them His hands and His side,”

Acts 20:7. “And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow; and continued his speech until midnight. And there were many lights in the upper chamber, where they were together.”

1 Cor. 16:1, 2. “Now concerning the collection for the saints . . . Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him, that there be no gathering when I come.”

“Behold to obey is better than sacrifice, and to hearken than the fat of rams.” I Sam. 15:22.

ernations. Peter must be more thoroughly converted in order to perform his duties.

In the vision given upon the house-top fitted him for the work, but he did not always retain it. He said to Cornelius, “Ye know how that it is an unlawful thing for a man that is a Jew to keep company or come unto one of another nation, but God has shewed me that I should call no man common or unclean.” Note, with Peter it was unlawful to go in and preach to Cornelius, but after his conversion it was expedient that he should go in and preach to those Gentiles. Now with our white brethren, it is lawful that they go in, but not expedient. Has God changed? In Peter’s day He made no difference between the races, neither

did He permit his servants to make a difference.

Peter did not always remember that wonderful manifestation of the power of God that convinced him that God was impartial. He allowed prejudice to engender racial proscription, in so much that when he visited the converts of the apostle Paul at Antioch, Paul withstood him to the face for he was to be blamed. “For before that certain came from James he (Peter) did eat with the Gentiles; but when they were come, he withdrew and separated himself, fearing them which were of the circumcision.” Cal. 2: 8-15. Thus Peter followed the plan of segregation because he feared man. Hence, our brethren do the same.

If it is necessary that we must be segregated and placed in local churches, then let the Negro follow the thread to the end and demand Negro conferences with Negro officers.

Strength of body and arms maintained by good, wholesome work. Prov. 31:17-19.

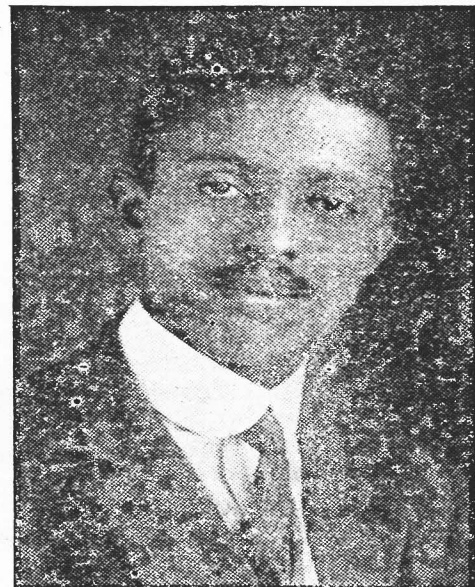
Business ability sufficient to look well to the needs of her

household. Prov. 31:21, 22.

Is not idle. Prov. 31:27.

Rules with wisdom and kindness. Prov. 31:26.
