## DEVELOPMENT AND SERVICE

Christian life is more than many take it to be. It does not consist wholly in gentleness, patience, meekness and kindness. These graces are essential; but there is need also of courage, force, energy, and perseverance. The path that Christ marks out is a narrow, self-denying path. To enter that path and press on through difficulties and discouragements require men who are more than weaklings.

Men of stamina are wanted, men who will not wait to have their way smoothed and every obstacle removed; men who will inspire with fresh zeal the flagging efforts of dispirited workers; men whose hearts are warm with Christian love, and whose hands are strong to do their Master’s work.

Some who engage in missionary work are weak, nerveless, spiritless, easily discouraged. They lack push. They have not those positive traits of character that give power to do something,—the spirit and energy that kindle enthusiasm. Those who would win success must be courageous and hopeful. They would cultivate not only the passive but the active virtues. While they are to give the soft answer that turns away wrath, they must possess the courage of a hero to resist evil. With the charity that endures all things, they need the force of character that will make their influence a positive power.

Some have no firmness of character. Their plans and purposes have no definite form and consistency. They are of but little practical use in the world. This weakness, indecision, and inefficiency should be overcome. There is in true Christian character an indomitableness that cannot be moulded or subdued by adverse circumstances. We must have moral backbone, an integrity that cannot be flattered, bribed, or terrified.

God desires us to make use of every opportunity for securing a preparation for His work. He expects us to put all our energies into its performance, and to keep our hearts alive to its

sacredness and its fearful responsibilities.

Many who are qualified to do excellent work accomplish little because they attempt little. Thousands pass through life as if they had no great object for which to live, no high standard to reach. One reason of this is the low estimate which they place upon themselves. Christ paid an infinite price for us, and according to the price paid He desires us to value ourselves.

Be not satisfied with reaching a low standard. We are not what we might be, or what it is God’s will that we should be. God has given us reasoning powers, not to remain inactive, or to be perverted to earthly and sordid pursuits, but that they may be developed to the utmost, refined, sanctified, ennobled, and used in advancing the interests of His kingdom.

Remember in whatever position you may serve, you are revealing motive, developing character. Whatever your work do it with exactness, with diligence; overcome the inclination to seek an easy task.

The same spirit and principles that one brings into the whole life, those who desire a fixed amount to do and a fixed salary, and who wish to prove an exact fit without the trouble of adaptation or training, are not the ones whom God calls to work in His cause. Those who study how to give as little as possible of their physical, mental and moral power, are not the workers upon whom He can pour out abundant blessings. Their example is contagious. Self-interest is the ruling motive. Those who need to be watched and who work only as every *duty is specified to them*, are not the ones who will be pronounced good and faithful. Workers are needed who *manifest energy, integrity, diligence*; those who are willing to do anything that needs to be done.

Many become inefficient by evading responsibilities for fear of failure. Thus they fail of gaining that education which results from experience, and which reading and study and all of the advantages otherwise gained cannot give them.

Man can shape circumstances, but circumstances should not be allowed to shape man. We should seize upon *circumstances as instruments with which to work*. We are to *master them*, but *should not permit them* to master us.

Men of power are often those who have been opposed, baffled, and thwarted. By calling their energies into action, the obstacles they meet prove to them positive blessings. They gain self-reliance. Conflict and perplexity call for the exercise of trust in God, and for that firmness which develops power.

Christ gave no stinted service. He did not measure His work by hours. His time, His heart, His soul and strength, were given to labor for the benefit of humanity. Through weary days He toiled, and through long nights He bent in prayer for grace and endurance that He might do a larger work. With strong crying and tears He sent His petitions to heaven, that His human nature might be strengthened, that He might be braced to meet the wily foe in all his deceptive workings, and fortified to fulfill his mission of uplifting humanity. To His workers He says, "I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done."

### SLAUGHTER OF THE INNOCENTS

A study of statistics reveals the terrible fact that nearly one-half of all the human beings born into the world die before the age of five years. In the city of Stetten, Germany, nearly one-half—473 out of every thousand—die during the first year of their lives. In Ireland, Scotland, Norway and Sweden, where children are given better care, have more outdoor life, and more intelligent attention is paid to feeding, the number of deaths is only one-fiftieth as many as in the city of Stetten, being 10 per cent.

Physicians are coming to recognize that the use of cow's milk which is infected with the germs of tuberculosis is one of the most active of all causes of death among young children. This should be remembered in the artificial feeding of infants. The milk should be either boiled or well scalded before being fed to the infant. This rule should be universally observed for adults as well as for children, and, if applied, will save thousands of lives annually.—*Good Health*.
